☐ Make certain all your pets wear ID tags □ Dogs and cats should wear collars □ Birds can wear leg rings ☐ Tattoo or microchip your pet and register your pet's number with a tattoo or microchip registration service. ☐ Your pet's ID tag should include a friend or relative's phone number as well as yours. ☐ Keep a supply of write-on ID tags, in case you're evacuated. Make sure your pet is wearing a tag with its new address. ☐ Put a sign in your front & back windows indicating number and types of pets. □ Date the signs and keep up to date ☐ Have several close-up photos and a record of your pet's size, weight and special markings. ☐ Arrange for out of area friends to take in pets KIT FOR YOUR PETS □ Pet carrier ☐ Leash & collar (dogs) / harness (cats) □ Week's supply of food & water for each pet □ Rotate every six months □ Food & water bowls □ Can opener for canned pet food □ Pet first-aid kit □ Blanket & paper towels □ Tovs ☐ Cat litter and disposable litter trays (aluminum roasting pans) □ Veterinarian info & vaccination certificates ☐ Fresh supply of any pet medications

☐ Photos & extra tags (in case pet gets lost)

☐ Cash to pay for emergency boarding

□ Location of animal shelter / humane society

KIT FOR YOUR OFFICE

Keep a small pack in your desk drawer.

- □ 1-2 boxes MREs
- □ 3 boxes / bags water
- ☐ Small first aid kit / tissues / wet wipes
- ☐ Some money in small bills & quarters
- ☐ Mylar blanket / Rain poncho
- □ Small AM / FM radio
- □ Solar-powered flashlight / light sticks
- □ Pocket knife / multi-purpose tool

ADDITIONAL TIPS

DON'T WAIT TO BUY SUPPLIES IN AN EMERGENCY THEY WILL NOT BE AVAILABLE!

- ☐ For items stored outside/in a garage:
 - Protect food from sunlight and heat/cold extreme temperatures
 - Use vermin-resistant containers
 - Put grains, rice, cereals and such into airtight containers
 - □ Buy nitrogen-gas packaged food products whenever possible
- ☐ Tarps and duct tape are must have multifunctional items.

Methods for Purifying Water

Water is the most important thing you need to survive.

- □ Boil water (full, rolling boil) for 10 minutes.
- □ Use 10 drops of bleach per gallon of water; let sit for at least 30 minutes.
